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U.S. SENATOR

Six-year term. One of two members of the U.S. Senate from Texas. With the U.S. House, the Senate makes laws; raises revenues, appropriates federal funds and manages the federal debt; regulates commerce among states and with other nations; declares war and maintains and regulates the military; establishes the federal court system and defines federal crimes; and directs the census every ten years. The Senate has the exclusive power to advise and consent on presidential nominations to executive and judicial offices, to ratify U.S. treaties, and to try impeachments. Current annual salary: \$174,000

★ QUESTIONS TO CANDIDATES

Qualifications: What training, experience, and characteristics qualify you for this position?

Economy: What specific policies would you support to address the growing wealth gap between the highest and lowest earners, and what do you see as the appropriate role of the federal government in this issue?

Immigration: What policy changes would you propose to make the U.S. immigration system more effective and humane?

Balance of Power: The Constitution establishes a system of checks and balances among the three branches of government. As a Senator, what specific actions would you take to preserve the system so that the federal government can serve the people?

Healthcare: What role should the federal government play in promoting a healthy American population, and what steps would you take to ensure that healthcare is affordable and accessible for all Americans?

Qualifications: I'm a civil rights & criminal defense multi-jurisdictional 20 year licensed attorney who served in the Texas House & in Congress as Vice

Ranking Member on Oversight & a Ranker on Judiciary Committee.

Economy: I'll repeal the Trump tariffs that are hurting American consumers and reform our tax structure to ensure the ultra-wealthy pay their fair share. This will allow us to deliver relief to the middle and working class and assistance for first-time home buyers and small businesses. Costs have gone up but wages haven't, which is why I'm co-sponsoring the Raise the Wage Act to increase the minimum wage.

Immigration: I support comprehensive immigration reform that prioritizes a pathway to citizenship that's secure, timely, and easy to navigate. In Congress, I introduced the CLEAR ID Act requiring ICE agents to identify

themselves and co-lead the Protecting Sensitive Locations Act to limit immigration enforcement at healthcare facilities, schools, courthouses, and houses of worship.

Balance of Power: I serve on the Judiciary Committee, the Supreme Court Task Force & am a multi-jurisdictionally licensed attorney of 20 years. We need to expand the court, which has been done 7 times before, and also need ethics reform as this group of justices has revealed itself to be compromised; i.e. Presidential Immunity.

Healthcare: I'm a proud cosponsor of Medicare For All. We must fully cover preventative health care, cap out-of-pocket costs, and eliminate premiums, deductibles, and co-pays. In Congress, I've cosponsored bills to: lower drug costs, allow Medicare coverage for cancer early detection screening, and address the mental health crisis by training providers. Our health care system must center patients, not profits

As Senator, I'll ensure every American can access a federal healthcare option like Medicare, cap copays for additional prescription drugs, protect reproductive care, and save rural hospitals. I'll protect Medicaid, Medicare, and the Affordable Care Act and fully fund the VA.

GOVERNOR

Four-year term. The governor is the chief executive of the state. They appoint members to boards and commissions; appoint statewide executive officials, state judges and district attorneys when vacancies occur; declare special elections to fill vacancies in certain elected offices; deliver the State of the State address; provide guidance to the legislature; call special sessions of the legislature and set the agenda; and serve as commander-in-chief of the state's military forces. The governor can veto legislation (including a line-item veto on appropriations), sign legislation, or allow it to become law without their signature. Current annual salary: \$153,750

★ QUESTIONS TO CANDIDATES

Qualifications: What training, experience, and characteristics qualify you for this position?

Healthcare: What changes need to be made to Texas abortion laws to ensure women have access to proper medical care in the event of pregnancy complications?

Education: Share your thoughts on the role of state and local government in public education.

Immigration: How would you address immigration issues affecting our state while ensuring all individuals within our borders have access to due process protections?

National Guard: Share your position on when it is appropriate for the Federal government to deploy the National Guard in Texas cities.



★ Patricia Abrego (D)

Qualifications: Since I was six years old, I have been training for this position. I have been a Doctor (DC) for 15 years and retired for 13 years. I am honest, knowledgeable, and kind.

Healthcare: In the event of pregnancy complications, we need to ensure that the mother is safe. Texas abortion laws need to change to ensure that the mother has a chance to live.

Education: The Department of Education has been downsized to a point where state and local governments

have to figure out public education on their own. I went to elementary, middle and high school at public schools. Families cannot afford to pay for their children's education, especially at the elementary level.

Immigration: My mother was born in Mexico, and my father was born in San Antonio, Texas. I have the experience of making sure that my mother was protected. She became a US citizen, got her GED, and became a CNA nurse. Everyone in Texas should have the right to his/her own individual immigration protection.

National Guard: The Texas governor can deploy the National Guard in Texas cities. The federal government should go through the Texas governor for this situation.

Qualifications: Served on Houston City Council and in the U.S. House. Worked on laws, oversight, and constituent services. Journalist-turned-

lawyer who values careful judgment, ethics, and practical innovation.

Healthcare: Texas abortion laws must be rewritten

to give doctors clear authority to act when a patient's health is at risk — without fear of criminal or civil penalties. Vague laws interfere with medical judgment and delay care. The law should also clearly allow abortion early in pregnancy, typically the first trimester, when most issues are identified and treated.

Education: Public education works best when the state provides stable funding and supports teachers, while local school boards make daily decisions and encourage

parental engagement. Our schools are still structured for another century, so we need thoughtful modernization to better serve students beyond the classroom, support teachers professionally, and meet evolving community needs.

Immigration: Community stability, economic health, due process for all, a secure border, and a fair, functional immigration system — all are essential. My ad-

ministration's approach would pair enforcement with due process protections while working to provide clear, accessible pathways to legal status and citizenship.

National Guard: Rarely if ever. Deployments should prioritize public safety and respect local authority during true emergencies. The National Guard is meant to assist, not to score political points.

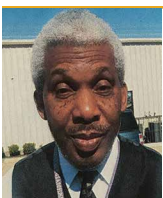

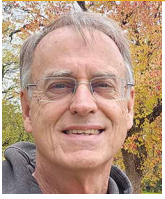

Texas water, power, and self-governance from long-term financial pressure

Healthcare: Watching the birth of our first daughter, I could not see the doctor's fear as he skillfully balanced life and death as both mother and child faltered. I owe him 38 years of blessing! I cannot imagine a world without my daughter—or my daughter without her mother. Over half of maternal deaths occur after birth, often postpartum, when care fades but risk remains. Thyroid, Thyroid, Thyroid.

Education: We assume earlier generations lacked wisdom, writing by candlelight. That illusion breaks when reading the U.S. Constitution—an unprecedented document that still endures. The family once grounded education, because more is caught than taught. As moral

foundations faded, have our outcomes improved—or declined? And will early adoption of AI hasten that decline?

Immigration: Texas should enforce worker-verification laws consistently and lawfully, removing incentives for illegal hiring and increase enforcement through whistleblowing. Today, federal pushes for massive data centers, untested nuclear projects, and space privatization are accelerating the depletion of Texas water security and straining power and governance. These efforts should pause until risks are understood and economic fairness for all Texans.

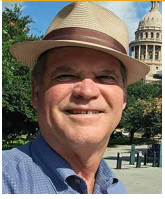

Desalination of ocean water is expensive, while storing rainwater is less costly.

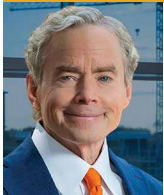

Rainy Day Fund: The Rainy Day Fund belongs to taxpayers, not the government. I'll examine how the ESF is invested to maximize benefits for its rightful owners, Texas taxpayers. It should be reserved for true emergencies so Texas can pay its bills on time. As a lifelong businessman, fiscal discipline matters to me, and I earned a 99% scorecard as a Texas Senator from Texans for Fiscal Responsibility.

Educational Savings Accounts (ESAs): I've always fought for education freedom and real competition, because competition lowers costs and raises the

quality. As Comptroller, I'll manage Texas' new Education Savings Account program so parents can choose the best school for their child. I'll ensure it's transparent and empowers parents with no strings attached.

VOTING IN TEXAS

The upcoming Primary Election is extremely important for Texas!

Primary Elections: Texas has an open primary system. This means all eligible voters can take part. You do not have to sign up with a political party ahead of time. When you vote in the primary, you choose one party's primary election or convention to participate in.

This Primary Election is held on March 3. If no candidate gets enough votes, a Runoff Election is held on May 26.

- The Republican and Democratic parties choose their candidates through primary elections.
- The Libertarian and Green parties choose their candidates at party conventions held at other times.

Since many districts in Texas heavily favor one party over the other, the primary elections often determine the winner of the General Election! Even if you do not strongly identify with any political party, you can and

should carefully consider the candidate choices and participate in one of the primaries or conventions to have your voice heard.

Important Note: Once you vote in a party's primary election or convention, you cannot vote in another party's primary or convention. If there is a runoff election, you may vote **only in the same party's runoff**.

The Democratic and Republican primary ballots may include non-binding propositions. These propositions gauge voter support on specific issues. The results help guide each party's legislative priorities, which are decided on at their respective conventions.

General Election: Voting in one party's primary election, convention or runoff election does NOT commit you to vote for a particular party or candidate in the November General Election. You can still vote for any candidate of your choice, regardless of party, in the General Election.

RAILROAD COMMISSIONER

Six-year term. The Railroad Commissioner is one of the three-member Texas Railroad Commission. The commission regulates the oil and gas industry, gas utilities, pipeline safety, safety in the liquefied petroleum gas industry and surface coal and uranium mining. New plugging requirement laws will help keep new wells from being added to the list. We need better oversight during the well-plugging activities to ensure our dollars are being spent effectively and wells are being properly plugged.

Public Participation: Texans deserve clear oversight, responsible stewardship of natural resources, and a Commission that is open about how decisions are made and how public input is used. Monthly RRC meetings

We also have an over abundance of produced water. I propose a \$.10 per barrel tariff on each barrel of produced water that is injected. At 30 million barrels per day, we’ll have \$1 billion in new annual revenue to plug the riskiest wells the right way.

Public Participation: First, allow remote electronic participation by the public. Second, actually ask questions during the monthly public meetings the Commission currently has that goes through 600+ agenda items in 30 minutes. Third, I would have factually informa-

tive social media posts as opposed to the current propaganda. The regulators need to regulate, not brag about how many wells they issued drilling permits for

Monitoring and Enforcement: I’ll be in the field, not in the office. I intend to travel the state to each of the districts, and help ensure experienced oil and gas men and women are leading with integrity. Treating everyone equally. That means consistent and fair application of the rules. I will also help create a portal for the public to more readily report and check on the status of their complaints.

Challenges: 1. Lack of accountability to the public. I have experienced firsthand how Commissioners treat those making public comments at the open meetings. They are condescending. It’s unacceptable. 2. Getting oil and gas money out of the political arena. Not just in this race, but in politics generally. Operationally - see above for water injection and orphaned wells.

pipelines, and right of ways.

Due to the high salinity and other corrosive properties under extreme pressure, the metal casing deteriorates over time which will cause subsurface damage long before it reaches the surface. We need to repurpose these wells for geothermal or lithium mining.

the time to drive to Austin, I plan to host district meetings monthly. That will give everyone the opportunity to come out and voice their concerns. I understand that there are a lot of concerns we need to address.

Monitoring and Enforcement: We need more inspectors. Or inspectors are overloaded with the territory they are expected to cover.

Challenges: Everyone has a vested interest in the industry they were elected to regulate. I have no vested interest in the industry. I do love the industry, but we need regulators, no more corporate self governance. We need representatives who are not afraid to have difficult conversations and take responsibility for issues such as lake Boehmer.

Philosophy: I believe deeply in what our courts are supposed to be: steady, independent, and grounded in the rule of law- that no one is above the law. I also believe that our laws should allow for flexibility to rise and shift in response to changes in our values but not to political pressures.

Equity: The Supreme Court is the highest arbiter of law in the state and should play an integral role in finding funding and people to make our justice system most accessible by the underserved. In my eyes, the court system is only as good as it treats those who need it most,

Issues: The greatest challenge the courts face is the insidious creep of ideology to our highest courts' chambers. Some judges have begun judging more from a personal-political basis in ways that have become destructive to the role of the third branch. I will address it one person at a time, one case at a time, not allowing these judicial lapses go unnoticed, with the goal of eliminating them forever.

Philosophy: The true delight in deciding cases is finding the right answer. When settled law gives an answer, the quest is easy. But when the answer is unclear, we must apply the principles that came before us. Stare decisis is real, and when judges fail to follow precedent, they create uncertainty and diminish respect for the judicial system. I will follow the law in deciding our state's most important cases

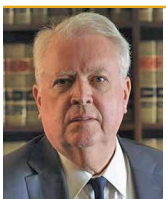

My articles emphasize that individuals must not only comply with the law in all matters, but also that they must do the right thing even when the law is silent or ambiguous, and even when doing the right thing is unpopular.

Equity: The Texas Supreme Court should be accessible to all citizens. There is an important role to be played by individuals and groups whose interests may be impacted by future rulings, and the court should be receptive and attentive to amicus curiae briefs (i.e., briefs filed by friends of the court).

Issues: The justices of every court in Texas swear an oath to uphold and defend the constitution and laws of the State of Texas and the United States. The judicial department of Texas is the third arm of the government, and under the Texas constitution, the separation of powers is explicitly stated. The justices of the Texas Supreme Court must base their decisions on the law and not popular opinions.

Philosophy: Like Justices Holmes and Brandeis, I be-

lieve a “common law” approach is the most vital. This was the prevailing judicial philosophy for most of the 20th century and is a form of pragmatism. A more popular judicial philosophy today is “originalism” which

proposes to interpret the law as it was understood when first enacted. The “common law” approach acknowledges that the world changes over time.

I strive for predictability and consistency so the parties know what to expect when they come to court. I treat everyone with courtesy and respect, regardless of socioeconomic status, political affiliation, or whether they have donated.

Equity: The Supreme Court chooses its cases, and should select cases that are important to all Texans—not just the well-resourced. It should also review cases mindful of the constitutionally embedded right to a trial by jury and should respect juries and their verdicts. The Court can adopt rules streamlining access

to justice for those with fewer resources, including self-represented litigants.

Issues: The persistent attacks on judges—both at the state and federal levels. The judicial branch is a co-equal branch of government, and maintaining judicial independence is necessary to sustain our democracy. I would rule based on the law and facts and strive for consistent and fair application of the law without favoring any party.

Philosophy: The Constitution requires every party appearing in Court be treated equally under the law and guarantees a right to a jury trial. My judicial philosophy is simple: apply the law equally to everyone who appears in court and ensure that juries and their verdicts are respected. Consistent and predictable application of the law is what every Texan should expect from our judicial system.

Ethics: Transparency is key to the public's trust in the judiciary. Aside from accurate and timely reporting to the Ethics Commission, a judge should make the parties aware of any potential conflicts of interest, either personal or professional, however slight, and let the parties decide if they wish to ask the judge to recuse herself. As a district judge, I have recused myself when necessary.

Issues: The most pressing challenge facing appellate courts is the length of time it takes for a case to

go through the appellate process. Delays occur at every turn, and victims of crime and defendants deserve a swift but thorough examination of the trial record and applicable law and a thoughtful appellate opinion addressing the issues raised in the case. Panel opinions could clear more cases quickly.

Philosophy: As a sitting district judge, people come before me facing the most difficult situations of their lives. Crime victims, defendants, their families, and their attorneys are looking to me to set the tone. I treat everyone with respect, I allow everyone to have their say, and I fully consider the arguments of both sides. You may not agree with my decision, but you will know that you were heard.

ply the law as written. If the law is properly interpreted and the result is not what the legislature intended, it is the legislature's job to rewrite the law. Judges should have the humility to accept their limited roles and limited wisdom.

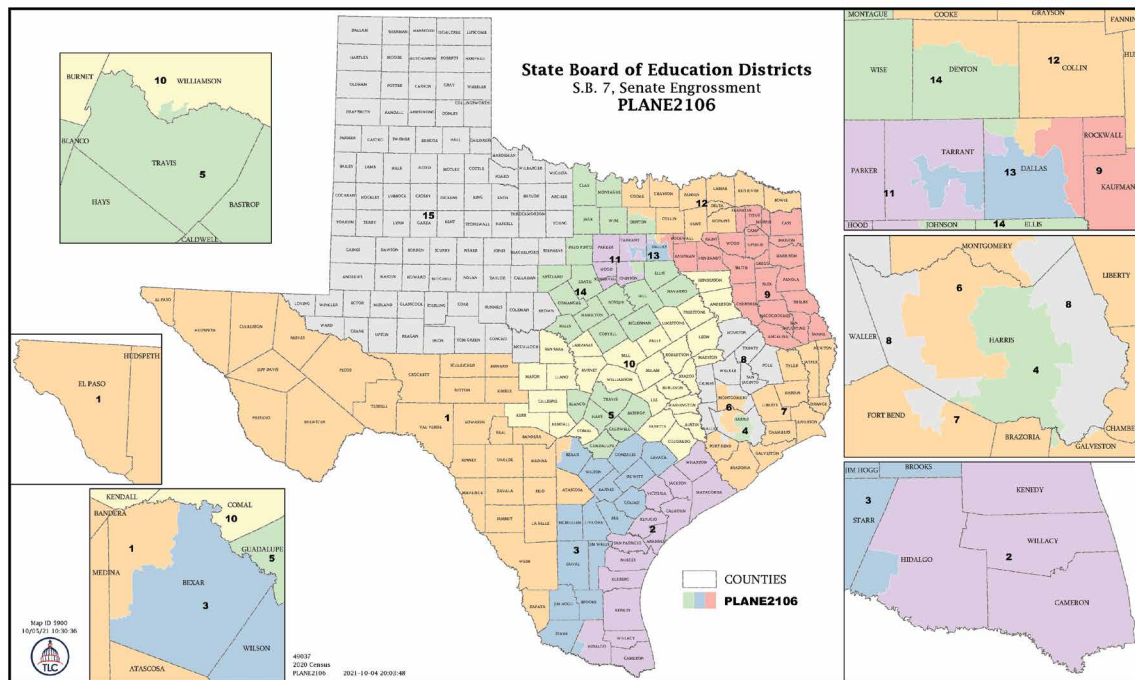
Although in some states, judges are appointed, in Texas most judges are elected. Judges make decisions about fundamental issues impacting family life, education, health care, housing, employment, finances, discrimination, civil rights, public safety, and government actions.

The Texas court system is made up of a statewide network of trial courts and courts of appeal. In trial courts, judges and/or juries evaluate the facts and the law and make a decision in a civil or criminal legal dispute. When decisions in most trial courts are appealed, they are sent to a court of appeal where judges consider what happened at the trial court, evaluate legal arguments, and then decide if a mistake was made.

STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Four-year term. The fifteen-member board decides curriculum, standards, student testing, special education programs, and textbooks for Texas public schools. A balanced approach to history should give students a better appreciation for differences across the world and avoid teaching intolerance and superiority.

Teacher Support: The SBOE votes to approve or veto rules developed by the State Board for Educator Certification. Before voting on rules, SBOE members should be well-informed about how the new rules impact what is taught to educators in preparation programs and the impact on instructional practices in the classroom. This will require research and a deep understanding of education philosophies.

Digital Education: Technology should support in-

struction, not replace what works. Teacher Support: Supporting teachers with high-quality instructional materials should be a top SBOE priority, especially for early-career educators. Social Studies Curriculum: The recently approved social studies framework has an excellent balance of each. Historical documents should be used to accurately teach core constitutional principles, civic duties, and global context. Texas history is American history, and teaching both thoroughly will build informed, responsible citizens who understand their state, their nation, and their place in the wider world.

Teacher Support: The SBOE has strengthened instruction by encouraging high-quality residencies. Data shows that 90% percent of candidates who complete Texas' high-touch, hands-on model return for a third year of teaching. The SBOE should review data to evaluate the results of teacher mentorship programs and instructional materials/resources to ensure every teacher has sufficient training, tools and resources.

Digital Education: The SBOE can blend technology

with proven teaching by using digital tools and AI to enhance—not replace—traditional teaching. AI in particular offers exciting possibilities, but it must be used carefully and responsibly to protect students and keep learning grounded in strong instruction. I would never want a child's education to rely solely on computers without guidance from a live adult teacher.

Religion in Public Schools: I believe that parents should guide their children's moral and ethical upbringing according to their own values. However, Texas law says that there must be TEKS for religious literature that ensure school districts provide religious instruction—either integrated into other subjects or, where appropriate, as a standalone course—as a condition of accreditation.

stones we have accomplished, should generate Socratic feedback and engagements.

Teacher Support: Upon elected, I will strengthen teacher preparation by clearly aligning curriculum standards with classroom realities. I intend to streamline certification with higher quality control for new teachers, including mentorship. I will push for more professional development funding—especially in content knowledge, pedagogy, and student support—to help teachers deliver better instruction.

Digital Education: SBOE should promote technology use that enhances, not replaces, instruction. Clear guidelines can encourage digital tools for personalization, access, and skill-building while preserving proven

methods like discussion. Take it from a special education teacher who provides accommodations for strugglers.

Religion in Public Schools: Legally, we have the constitution that expressly forbids holding another religion above another— even indirectly. The Establishment Clause and First Amendment rights protect impression-

able children from this. The goal is to live and let live; however, even as an ordained minister, it pains me to not allow God in the conversation. I believe in the Constitution and will promote balance and equity.

Social Studies Curriculum: K–12 social studies should ground students in a true and honest account of Texas history and frame it within a national and global context. Students should understand how events in Texas connect to larger U.S. and world events. Instruction recognizes that Texas both shapes and is shaped by the wider world, and prepares them to be informed citizens in a global society, not just memorizers of facts.

Teacher Support: The SBOE can strengthen teacher support by prioritizing preparation programs grounded in real classroom experience, mentorship, and subject-area expertise. Certification should be rigorous without unnecessary barriers. Professional development should be teacher-led, practical, and classroom-relevant. Supporting teachers as professionals improves retention and leads to stronger instruction.

Digital Education: Technology should support—not replace—learning. Teachers report that overuse of AI is

weakening students' critical thinking and writing skills, which are rooted in learning how to think. Students need to read whole novels and engage in sustained writing rather than test-prep excerpts or shortcuts. Teachers should have the autonomy to decide when technology enhances versus hinders learning.

Religion in Public Schools: Public schools should not promote or endorse any religion. Religious topics may be taught in an academic, historical, or literary context, but instruction must remain neutral and inclusive. Faith formation belongs to families and religious communities, not the state. Maintaining religious neutrality protects students' freedom of belief and ensures public schools serve all Texans.

Other Issues: One of the most pressing issues for the SBOE is protecting academic freedom and keeping politics out of curriculum decisions. The board must prioritize transparency, high-quality instructional materials, and long-term literacy and critical thinking over ideological agendas. Public schools should be places where students are supported and prepared to think critically, engage civically, and succeed.

Qualifications: I am a software developer who brings my STEM expertise and data-driven judgment to the table to support strong schools, improve student outcomes, and advocate policies that reflect classroom needs.

Social Studies Curriculum: Social studies should balance state, national, and world history. Giving younger students a broad historical picture and revisiting topics in later grades allows them to recontextualize events to understand how previous actions shape future decisions and events. This leads to the development of civic identity and global awareness.

Teacher Support: Texas faces significant teacher attrition. One way to alleviate this is to advocate the state for higher minimum salaries and ensuring the state funds them through teacher incentive allotment (TIA).

Certifications costs can also be cheaper and the process of certification can be improved while maintaining its high quality.

Digital Education: Physical books, paper, and pencils should be all that is needed for younger students to understand how to do math, write complete sentences, and understand concepts before technology is introduced to them. As they get older, use of a computer to type papers and research can be used but a reliance on technology without the foundations leads to less understanding and reduced critical thinking.

Religion in Public Schools: Public schools should not promote or teach any specific religion, including Christianity. Religion should only be discussed objectively in the context of history or culture to understand its impact on civilizations. Religious belief and doctrine are personal choices and should be taught by families and religious institutions, not public schools.

with Texas youth as a community college professor and administrator.

Social Studies Curriculum: Social studies education is essential in preparing the next generation to be engaged citizens and responsible community members. We owe it to our children to ensure that history is accurately taught in schools and that all high school graduates leave school with a firm understanding of civics, governance, and economics. Texas youth are the global workers of tomorrow—they should be well-rounded.

Teacher Support: The State Board of Ed has great power and great responsibility. We need to ensure that teaching positions are filled with qualified candidates, while also acknowledging that there is a teacher short-

age. We need to reassess teacher pay and benefits, routes to alternate certification that actually work, and methods to retain veteran teachers. Professional development is critical in this mission.

Digital Education: I'm not writing responses with generative AI, but I could be. We now live in a reality where we can fear technology or use it to our benefit. Understanding the complexities of technology is something that I'm deeply interested in and on day one, I would prioritize ways to train teacher in digital instruction and new learning technologies (while also dedicating time to be understand tech ethics).

Religion in Public Schools: Religion has no place in our public schools. The First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution guarantees the right to freedom of religion (including none). Christian ideology or curriculum in TX schools is an assault to this constitutional right. As educators, we can respect a student's individual right to freedom of religion while also maintaining the core belief of separation of church and state.

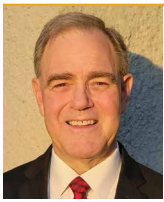

Social Studies Curriculum: The course curriculum is set by statute and SBOE vote already. What are being developed now are the individual course TEKS. I have submitted pages of written testimony to SBOE with specific suggestions to improve the TEKS. For a general outline, go to vachriscampaign.com. There is not enough room in 400 characters to specify changes to one course, never mind all of chapter 113 TAC.

Teacher Support: While there is currently an emphasis on teaching methodology, there is far too little emphasis on teaching facts and specific subject matter. Teacher professional development should include methods to teach specific content as specified in the TEKS. This should emphasize student memorization of basic material such as times tables, historical timelines with key facts, etc.

Digital Education: Digital Education, including cal-

culators, should not be used in elementary grades. Students need to learn to read the printed word. Students need to learn to calculate with pencil and paper. Student testing should be on paper. Federal Title one requires State student tests but does NOT require on-line testing. This should be reserved for upper grades. Computer Sciences should include MS Excel.

Religion in Public Schools: Our Judeo-Christian heritage is embedded into our legal system and our entire culture. It is WRONG to murder or steal. History should teach the Christian religious founding of the colonies, this is historical reality. The role of Christians in the abolition movement is historical reality. CHIEF JUSTICE AND JUSTICE, COURT OF APPEALS

Each of these Courts includes a Chief Justice and at least two other Justices. These Courts hear appeals on civil and criminal cases from lower courts in their districts. BE A TEXAS VOTER!

Whichever way you choose to vote, be sure you are registered by checking at **VoteTexas.gov**! You must be registered before you can vote! Then, vote in one of the following ways.

VOTE BY MAIL

- You can vote by mail if you are:
 - 65 years or older
 - Sick or disabled
 - Out of the county during early voting and on Election Day
 - Expecting to give birth within 3 weeks before or after Election Day
 - In jail, but otherwise eligible to vote.
- To vote by mail in Texas, you must apply every year! Go to **lwvtexas.org/VotebyMail** for a vote-by-mail application and easy-to-understand instructions on voting by mail.
- Track your ballot at **VoteTexas.gov**! If there is an error in your vote-by-mail application or ballot, your county election office is required to notify you and instruct you how to fix it either by mail, in person or via the online tracker.

VOTE IN PERSON

- During early voting, you may vote at any polling place.
- On Election Day:
 - In some counties, you can vote at any polling place.
 - In other counties, you can vote only at your precinct.
- Find polling places on your county election website or at **VOTE411.org**.
- If you have a disability, you may request to move ahead of other voters in line.
- If in line before the poll closing time, you must be allowed to cast a ballot.

VOTE IN PERSON USING CURBSIDE VOTING

- If you are physically unable to enter the polling place without personal assistance or likelihood of injuring your health, you may park at the curbside voting parking space and call the number that is posted to ask that an election officer bring a ballot to your car.
- However, you must sign a form declaring, under penalty of perjury, that you cannot physically enter the polling station without personal assistance or without putting your health at risk.
- After you mark your ballot, give it to the election officer or hand it to a companion to deposit in the ballot box for you.

VOTE EVEN IF YOU ARE A SUSPENDED VOTER

You can still vote if your voter registration is in suspense as long as you are registered in your county! “Suspense” means that your county voter registrar needs to confirm your voting address.

PURGED FROM THE VOTER ROLLS?

If you receive a notice requesting proof of citizenship for your voter registration and you are a U.S. citizen, do not ignore it. Contact your county voter registrar or election office immediately to confirm your registration status and learn what steps, if any, you need to take to remain eligible to vote.

VOTE A LIMITED BALLOT

If you have moved to a new county and have not registered in that county by the registration deadline, you may be eligible to vote a limited ballot in your new county. A limited ballot is one that allows you to vote on candidates and measures that are on the ballot for both your former county and your new county, such as statewide and national races.

Note: Voting a limited ballot is only available during early voting at your county’s main early voting polling place.



VOTER ID: WHAT TO TAKE TO THE POLLS

You may use one of seven forms of photo ID, listed below.

- Texas Driver License
- Texas Election Identification Certificate
- Texas Personal Identification Card issued by the Department of Public Safety (DPS)
- Texas Handgun License issued by DPS
- US Military Identification card containing your photograph
- US Citizenship Certificate containing your photograph
- US Passport (book or card)

Note:

- IDs may have expired up to four years.
- Persons 70 years or older may use an expired ID, regardless of expiration date.
- ID address does not have to match the voter registration address.
- The name on the photo ID should match the name on the list of registered voters or be “substantially similar”. If your name doesn’t match exactly, you can still vote but will need to sign a form stating you are the person on the list of registered voters.

If you are registered but do not have a photo ID and cannot reasonably obtain one, you may sign a form and present alternative documentation. Learn more at lwtexas.org/Voter-ID.

VOTER HARASSMENT

- Election officials cannot question a voter about the use of an ID type.
- Poll watchers may never question a voter about Voter ID issues.
